# **OPPORTUNITIES**

#### MEAL PREPARATION

Assist with cleanup during and after your assignment. Wash dishes, sweep, mop, etc.

#### **MEAL DELIVERY**

Arrive mid-day to pick up meals to deliver to an elder's home. Stay for a short visit if the elder is receptive to company.

#### DRIVE ELDERLY GUESTS

Pick up a few elderly guests at their homes and drive them to the dinner party. Stay and enjoy a meal with them.

#### MUSICAL ENTERTAINMENT

Do you play the piano, guitar, violin, or sing? Provide a festive atmosphere as elderly guests arrive and during the dinner party. Take a break when the meal is served to enjoy the meal yourself.

#### NURSING HOME GIFT DELIVERY

Pickup gifts from LBFE to deliver to elders residing in nursing homes.

# DRIVE TO CARE

LBFE has a critical need for volunteer drivers.

Our Drive to Care volunteer engagement campaign provides mileage reimbursement for volunteers who use their own vehicles. This initiative is designed to reduce barriers to volunteering.

Through our Medical
Transportation Program, LBFE
arranges rides to and from
medical appointments for our
elderly friends free of charge to
ensure they can keep their
essential appointments.

They rely on us because they are unable to drive themselves. They

may not be able to afford public transportation or taxi service, they require standby assist through our door-through-door service, or they require a wheelchair accessible vehicle.

Volunteers provide knowledgeable and compassionate service who give reassurance, friendship, and assistance.



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# SCAMS KNOW NO BOUNDARIES by Leslie Bek



Scamming of elderly people knows no boundaries. With the connectivity of our

world today your physical location is no longer a protective factor. At times we fall victim to assumptions of certain levels of safety in our communities and the 'not in my backyard' mentality. The harsh reality is many bad things are here, just not as visible until they appear in your email inbox or ring up your phone.

If you suspect a scam, there are a few important steps you should take right away. Do not share your personal or financial information and contact your local police or sheriff's office to report the scam.

"Scams may vary in the details, but they usually contain the same ingredients. If it's an urgent or secret request, contains a personal connection to you somehow or asks for money in an unusual payment type like a gift card, trust your gut and assume whoever is contacting you is trying to take advantage."

# ADDRESSING COMMUNITY NEED

The LBFE Vision Committee began an assessment of our Ontonagon County service area this summer.

Ontonagon County has a significantly higher population of older adults aged 65 and older (38.7%) than Michigan (19.2%) and national (17.7%) averages. The needs of an aging population in a rural area, coupled with lack of senior services and transportation were compounded by the abrupt closure of the only hospital in the county in April 2024.

We began by assessing current LBFE programming, community need, and potential growth of LBFE programs based on need and community resources.

We are having conversations with community leaders, agencies, and other key stakeholders in Ontonagon County.

A questionnaire of LBFE elderly friends and volunteers residing in Ontonagon has given us their perspective of this community.

Initial feedback identifies medical transportation as a primary need for older adults in Ontonagon County. While LBFE has a robust medical transportation program in Houghton and Keweenaw

Counties, we are a volunteer-based organization dependent on volunteers in our service areas for sustainable program delivery.

While the project is not complete, we have made significant progress to assess the community needs and the potential impact and growth of LBFE in the community.

Next steps include compiling and analyzing all data that has been collected and outlining our goals and objectives based on our findings that align with community need and the LBFE mission.

Initial consideration includes focusing our Drive to Care Volunteer Engagement campaign in Ontonagon to recruit volunteer medical transportation drivers.

We are also considering a potential new program to foster telehealth options for older adults.

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This summer, volunteers completed the building of a second woodshed to store cut and split firewood.

This completes the development of the woodlot since it's acquisition in 2016.

LBFE is grateful to everyone who helped with building the shed this year. Volunteers and staff put in over 200 hours into the project.

Each year the Firewood Program relies on donations

of logs from local mills. This year, J.M. Longyear and Northern Hardwoods donated 75 cords.

Many individual volunteers help with chainsaw maintenance, cutting logs, splitting, deliveries, and stacking.

Volunteer groups split the wood, including over a dozen MTU student groups, fraternities, and sororities.

The success of the program

to warm the hearts and homes is only made possible by the contributions of many.

Last fiscal year, LBFE delivered 138 truckloads of firewood to 76 elderly friends who use firewood as a primary or back-up source of heat who otherwise could not afford to purchase it themselves.
